Recipe Corner

Chocolate Dipped Shortbread Cookies

1 cup butter

½ cup sugar

2 cups flour

1 teaspoon of vanilla

6 ounces chocolate chips, melted

Cream butter and sugar, add flour and vanilla. Pinch dough to ½" balls, roll in sugar and place on cookie sheet. Use the tines of a fork to flatten cookies. Bake at 350°F for 12-15 minutes. Remove from baking sheet, cool 10-15 minutes. Dip half of each cookie into melted chocolate and chill to set.

Holiday Safety

- *Fresh trees are less likely to catch fire, so look for a tree with vibrant green needles that are hard to pluck and the branches don't easily break.
- *Always place your tree away from heat sources like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights. Keep the tree base filled with water to avoid it getting dry.
- *Make sure all your indoor and outdoor Christmas lights have been tested for safety and throw out any damaged lights.
- *Even a well-watered tree should be taken down after 4 weeks. If you've decorated your real tree right after Thanksgiving, it should be discarded the week after Christmas, not New Year's Day.

Christmas Tree Disposal

Christmas trees will be picked up during the first two weeks of January 2016. Please remove all tree bags, ornaments, tinsel and stands. Cut all trees taller than six feet in half.
